Dear Mrs. Planck,

I have just received a copy of Professor Planck's
Self-biographie with Professor von Laue's address and
I see that it was sent to me at your request.

Thank you for thinking of sending me a copy. I shall
always value very highly this printed record of Professor
Planck's life.

I was asked by the Editors of "Nature" to write a
notice about him and I am enclosing a few copies
of it. My great fear is that I may not
have done him personally or his work justice.

But who could? It is not possible to express
adequately with what regard and affection he was held
in English speaking countries.

At home we often speak of you and of your visit.
Just now we are in a great state of excitement. We
expect Ruth's father and mother in the course of the
next two weeks. Permits have been granted and travel
tickets paid for so that all is ready for the journey.
Janet is speaking more and more German in anticipation

of the visit. She makes great progress and there seems every hope that she will grow up bilingual. I hope she may belong to a generation which will believe in cooperation. The photograph of Professor Blanch and Janeli with yourself in the background has been enlarged and now hangs in my room here - it has made a very charming picture.

We hope very much that you will one day visit England again and that we shall have the pleasure of entertaining you.

We have decided to keep the house at Pillerton as our chief home and have had the London house divided into flats. This makes life much easier - it gives me the necessary foothold in London without all the difficulties nowadays associated with running a whole house in town.
